DNR Stocked Walleye Fingerlings in Fall 2013

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources stocked over 36,000 walleye fingerlings in Lake Francis in the fall of 2013. According to Gene Jeseritz, the fingerlings were smaller than in previous years. Lake Francis is stocked with walleye fingerlings once every three years. The next netting survey for Lake Francis is scheduled for 2015. *Privately stocked in 2004.




July 4th Boat Parade Organizer


CROW awarded \$124,200 to study Lake Francis and Other Area Lakes

The Crow River Organization of Water (CROW) has a long history of assessing water quality in its lakes and streams. The overall mission of CROW's comprehensive water resource program is to protect and improve the natural, aesthetic, and recreational qualities of its lakes, rivers, and wetlands for enjoyment by local and regional residents. A great many of these water resources are impaired and do not meet state water quality standards, but there are some key resources that enjoy good water quality.

CROW was awarded \$124,200 from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to develop a diagnostic study for key lakes and identify implementation strategies for their protection and improvement. The project will focus on ten lakes: Minnie-Belle, Manuella, Stella, Lake Washington, Francis, West Sylvia, East Sylvia, John,

Charlotte, and Martha. These lakes are located throughout Meeker and Wright counties which are part of lake chains in which the whole chain is not impaired, and the protection strategies developed through this project will complement the TMDL implementation efforts to focus on comprehensively managing the chain as a system.

This project is important because all of the lakes are significant components because they provide quality water to the North Fork Crow River which is locally and regional important because it empties into the Mississippi River 20

miles upstream from the Minneapolis Water Plant intake. The Mississippi River provides drinking water to Minneapolis and is a premier smallmouth bass fishery.

Watershed Rain Barrel Sale – Limited Supply

The CROW is taking pre-orders for rain barrels through April 4. The purchase of a rain barrel is one way for landowners to help decrease runoff to your lake. Rain barrels can capture and store roof runoff from small to medium size rain events. Water stored in rain barrels can be used to water flowers, landscape areas or irrigate lawns in between rain events.

As the water run over hard surfaces it can come into contact with a variety of contaminants like: oil, salt, fertilizers, pesticides, bacteria and trash. As a result, runoff contributes and effects local water quality. Disconnecting your downspout can help reduce direct runoff from small rain events. The more people that use rain barrels, the greater impact we have on improving our water quality in local lakes and river.

The Rain Barrel Kit includes: barrel, mesh screen top, hoses and connections. Pickup will be with the Meeker SWCD Tree Sale (anticipated to be April 26) at the Meeker County Fairgrounds. DNR's New Mobile Website is a Boon to Outdoor Recreationalists

A new, one-of-a-kind website that employs extensive mapping resources to help users locate hunting lands, state parks and forests and a wide range of other recreational areas is now available on mobile devices such as phones and tablets, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources announced.



After accessing the website at www.mndnr.gov/mobile/compass, users can bookmark it among other favorites on their mobile device.

"The website helps you find opportunities for recreation when you're away from your computer," said DNR Commissioner Tom Landwehr. "It not only provides you with the location of recreation lands, but you can also find information such as types of vegetation and availability of trails and other resources."

The mobile Recreation Compass features more than 5.5 million acres of public lands administered as state forest, wildlife management areas, state parks and recreation areas, waterfowl production areas, aquatic management areas, and scientific and natural areas, state trails, including water trails, Walk-In

access areas, hunter walking trails and nearly 3,000 public water access sites. The mobile website has lake, river and stream names, as well as federal, state and local highways and roads.

The agency opted to create the service as a mobile website instead of an app because a mobile website is device independent and can be easily updated and maintained. The mobile website runs on just about anything using a modern web browser.

The Recreation Compass has been available on desktop and laptop computers since 1998, but the mobile version was developed in 2013 and has been tested extensively since last August.

The mobile Recreation Compass also links to other DNR mobile websites such as LakeFinder and Fall Colors.

Know Your Ice

Color Meanings

Although a useful indicator, color

alone should not be relied upon. For

instance, ice of any color subjected to

a running water force underneath will

be weaker than ice not subject to that

pressure. In general, you can surmise

the following from ice colors:

- White to opaque: Water-saturated snow freezes on top of ice forming another thin ice layer. Most times it's weak due to being porous from air pockets.
- Blue to clear: High density, very strong, safest ice to be on if thick enough, stay off if less than 4" thick.
- Mottled and slushy or "rotten" ice: Not so much its color but its texture. This ice is thawing and slushy. It is deceptive it may seem thick at the top but it is rotting away at the center and base. Most prevalent in spring, may be showing signs of browns from plant tannins, dirt and other natural materials that are resurfacing from thawing. Not suitable for even a footstep.

Ice Shelter Removal Date March 4

- If shelters are not removed, owners will be prosecuted, and the structure and contents may be confiscated and removed, or destroyed by a conservation officer.
- After removal dates, shelters may remain on the ice between midnight and one hour before sunrise only when occupied or attended.
- Storing or leaving shelters on a public access is prohibited
- It is unlawful to improperly dispose of ice fishing shacks anywhere in the state. Please clean up around your shack and check with local refuse providers or landfills for ice shelter disposal information.

Statewide MN COLA Group Pushes Protecting Public Waters

(St. Paul, Minn.-January 7, 2014) Today, the Minnesota Coalition of Lake Associations (MN COLA) is releasing its Legislative Agenda for consideration in the 2014 Minnesota State Legislative Session.

The overall intention of our 2014 legislative platform is to protect the waters of the state more effectively and more vigorously than in the past. Our waters are a precious natural resource, and they are a critical component of both our way of life and Minnesota's \$11 billion tourism industry. Minnesota must do more to halt the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS), which can have a devastating impact on water quality, habitat, and recreational use.

Every month the DNR declares more and more Minnesota lakes and sub-watershed systems as infested by one AIS or another. The time is now to increase protection for our lakes by means of increased inspection/decontamination programs, new funding sources, and long-term funding for scientific research. The University of Minnesota has only recently begun working on research that could help stop the spread of AIS, but possible outcomes are years away. We believe these specific legislative changes must be addressed:

- Modification to AIS Minnesota Statute 84D to specifically follow the "Uniform Minimum Protocol and Standards (UMPS) for Watercraft
- Interception Programs for Dreissenid Mussels in the Western United States" or more restrictive protocols for AIS programs which are substantiated by science-based research;
- Modification to Minnesota AIS Statute 84D to require a certified thermal decontamination process for non-compliance of AIS laws. This process must deliver consistent results, be readily available for public use, and includes:
 - * A control mechanism as a means to verify thermal decontamination has been completed after non-compliance;
 - * A required certified training program for every decontamination equipment operator;
 - * A third-party verification program to ensure decontamination procedures are consistently followed;
 - * An annual legislative report by the State Agency administrating the decontamination program;
- Use of Outdoor Heritage Fund (portion of 2008 Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment) to protect fish habitat from AIS; with funds available to Local Government Units (LGU) for thermal decontamination equipment and programs;
- Establishment of a long-term funding source for AIS field programs such as an AIS decal purchase for all watercraft;
- Establishment of adequate long-term funding for the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) at the U of M to develop effective prevention and containment methods for invasive animals and more effective control methods to reduce aquatic invasive plant populations;

Minnesota must respond immediately to the AIS threats facing our Land of 10,000 Lakes in order to preserve our outdoor recreational traditions, native fish populations and habitat, and water quality, all of which are essential to our tourism industry. If left unchecked, there may not be an opportunity for reversal. Future generations are counting on us today to do the right thing. We simply cannot rely on "personal responsibly" and our current ineffective solutions.
